Police

Chief Snell, requested approval for new computer equipment for the Assessor’s Office. Wayne Freeman recently met with Brad Brennan and the computers in that office are slow. Based on the work they do, there is a need to upgrade their computers, which would make it more efficient for them. The cost of that would be \$3,451.80 including the licensing fees and the Lotus Smart Sweep Millennium Addition.

Jeanne Kulesa stated that to pay for this, the Assessor’s Office has STAR FUNDS and has currently \$25,000.00 in their reserve. My suggestion was that they should use their reserve money to pay for these computers as you can only use this money for things in the Assessor’s Office.

Ms. Tarwacki asked if any of the computers could be upgraded by adding additional memory.

Chief Snell stated that there are issues with them and it would probably cost more in the long run, so you’d probably be better off to buy new as you are talking about the processor speed, hard drives and memory.

Mr. Rybak – What is the cost?

Chief Snell stated that the cost is \$3,451.80 and that initially, he thought that they could replace them with refurbished computers as they have in other departments, but, when Wayne came back and explained the type and amount of work they are doing, it wouldn’t be wise to go with a refurbished computer. They need high quality equipment.

Ms. Tarwacki – I understand that.

Motion was made by Ms. Tarwacki, seconded by Mr. Rybak, to authorize an expenditure of \$3,451.80 to purchase four new Dell Computers including licensing fees and the Lotus Smart Sweep Millennium Addition from the STAR FUND.

Comptroller Jean Kulesa stated that the 2008 Annual Report has been completed and was submitted to NY State on April 9, 2009 and a copy is on file in the Town Clerk's Office.

Ms. Tarwacki stated that she received Jeanne's memo and had included this information where some accounts are in the negative or are very low. You annotated that some things are not revenue.

Jeanne Kulesa – You have two different things. The memo is just about the annual report which is only one sheet and the other that may have gotten stuck, is just the usual report. Those others are the 2009 reports.

Ms. Tarwacki – For the record there is \$1,715,329.00 in the A Fund and \$103,122.00 in the B Fund and \$1,423,159.00 in the DB Fund, which is not a lot of spare cash floating around to manage a town this size.

Park & Recreation – None

Attorney – Justin Nackley stated that at the last meeting the board had voted on for Altman Enterprises to fix the problem that went out on their mailing, regarding the may vs. must issue. Our office has been in contact with Altman Enterprises and they have again asked us to bring it to the board for reconsideration and instead of having a mailing, to simply disburse it to people via hand delivery or a different courier than mailing it.

Ms Tarwacki asked for an explanation as she didn't remember the whole thing.

Justin Nackley – A notice went out for the brush collection and there was a typo. The information was presented that it must be placed in bags when the word should have been may have been placed in biodegradable bags. At the last meeting the board decided that they wanted these cards to be mailed out again. Altman's came to us and asked if they could just distribute these, rather than mailing them, by hand delivering these to the residents or by using a courier.

Mr. Rybak – They thought that would be cheaper than mailing them.

Justin Nackley – That is what they presented to us.

Mr. Dudzinski – They said it would run \$3,500.00 to send it by mail.

Justin Nackley – It is completely discretionary on the board. We were asked to do it, and I am bringing it to the board's attention.

Mr. Rybak – I think as long as every resident gets the information from Altman, how they get it is up to them rather than if it is by mail or special delivery.

Mr. Corl – I think we need to be assured that it is being distributed and by mailing there is a method to check.

Justin Nackley – I am not sure how they are going to effectuate it.

Mr. Dudzinski – It is unfortunate that this came up, but, one of the bidders who did not get the bid is the one who brought it to our attention. The bid package said it a specific way and there was some type of oversight and he brought it to our attention. That is why we are requesting Altman to do it, the proper way.

Mr. Corl stated that otherwise it may be confusing to the taxpayer as to what their responsibilities are. It is also a timing issue. I don't see them being able to hand deliver these, before they start collecting.

Mr. Dudzinski – They start the 20th.

Justin Nackley – Again it is discretionary and up to the board.

Mr. Rybak – The timing is a factor regarding this if they start picking up on April 20, 2009. They haven't got too much time left.

Mr. Corl – I feel the only way we can guarantee that the people get this information is for this to go by mail. It is unfortunate that they are going to have an extra cost for doing business, but, this is their first year in doing it and there is a protocol that has to be followed.

Mr. Dudzinski – We can make another resolution stating that it has to be mailed, before their first pickup date.

Mr. Dudzinski asked the board member if they were in consensus with having Altman send out another mailing and each member responded yes. The resolution that was adopted previously still stands and it will be necessary for Altman's to send another mailing with the correct wording.

Engineer - None

Zoning – Wayne Dean made the board aware that the Drainage Committee had a request from the developer of The Bluff's to be able to fill in the easement and put a driveway in the easement. As it turned out, the easement is not only a path for the pipe, but, it is a floodway in case there is a big storm, as it allows the water to run down to the lake. It is on the property or the lot next to Oneida Shore's Park. The Drainage Committee looked at it and denied it last week as we didn't think it was a good idea. Since then, we have been asked to look at a new option that they have come up with and that is to bury a larger pipe that would take the overflow from a designed storm to the lake beneath the driveway. I just wanted the board to be aware of this so that you would know what is going on should you hear anything. We are having O'Brien & Gere review their calculations to make sure that the pipe that they are putting in, is large enough and that the capacity is there to take the design storm. Once we know if it is or not, I will poll the Drainage Committee and either deny it again or accept it and then will present it to the board because it is an easement and would need authorization to fill in an easement.

Another item we have is that we have three people in Brewerton who are asking for relief from the moratorium. I spoke with Heather this morning and this will require a public hearing, so I'd like the board to set a public hearing date for your next meeting on April 27, 2009.

Motion was made by Mr. Dudzinski, seconded by Mr. Corl, to set April 27, 2009 at 6:30 p.m. at Cicero Town Hall, 8236 South Main Street, Cicero, NY, for a public hearing to consider relief from the Brewerton Moratorium for Brewerton Sports on Bartell Road, the old hardware store on Route 11, and the Oswego Valley Insurance Association located at 9643 Route 11 for these businesses to do outside work.

Wayne Dean stated that he had a request from the property owner on the corner of Oak Street and Bear Road to subdivide her property to do some work there. After I looked at it, there is one little corner that includes Oak Street and there are about 16 houses on that street that are still zoned as agricultural. For this person to do this work, she would need a zone change. I would like the board to set a public hearing for April 27, 2009 to consider a zone change for this.

Wayne Dean explained that he would like to have the zone change from AG to R-10 for the entire street that consists of approximately 16 houses.

Mr. Conway stated that he wished to bring up one thing regarding The Bluff's that was discussed earlier as they are intending to build a wall 2 feet out from the fence that goes down to the County Park and is 30 or 40 feet down from the upper catch basin. It would raise that driveway up about 2 feet above the park property and if you were to get a 100 year flood the water would surely go right down the front and side of the park property. I want you to realize that they are talking about putting a wall that is 120 feet along that fence.

Motion was made by Mr. Dudzinski, seconded by Mr. Rybak, to set May 11, 2009, at 6:30 p.m. at Cicero Town Hall, 8236 South Main St., Cicero NY, for a public hearing to consider a zone change from AG to R-10 for property on the corner of Oak Street and Bear Road.

Brad Brennan stated that it wouldn't and that he has spoken to that person and reviewed her property. Reconfiguring those lots will not affect the taxes and it will not affect the rest of properties on the street, because it doesn't affect their market value.

Assessor – Brad Brennan explained that two weeks ago they mailed out the RFP for the reassessment project. We mailed four and e-mailed 10, so we were able to save over \$40.00 on that. Last Thursday, we had a pre-proposal meeting and only two contractors came in. As part of the RFP, we said that we were going to have that on that date at that time, which was 10:00 a.m. GAR Associates came and Maxwell Appraisals came. Their questions were just for clarification. They wanted to know how we were doing certain things and wanted to know if they were required to use the office space that we said would be available. The State was there and we answered those questions and we are going to prepare a response and I will mail or e-mail the responses to those questions to everyone who has originally received the RFP. We are moving forward with that.

Ms. Tarwacki – We proposed that they could use the open space at William Park.

Brad Brennan – That's correct.

Ms. Tarwacki – Did they want to know if they had to use that space, or if the town be paying for their use of another space?

Brad Brennan – The question came from Maxwell Appraisal, who is local and who has offices on Taft Road. He thought that they would do much of his work there, but, may need William Park for their informal work. We explained that it wasn't required, but, it was available.

**REQUEST THAT THE TOWN OF CICERO FULLY SUPPORT THE CHAMBER'S
APPLICATION FOR NY MAIN STREET FUNDS FOR
THE HAMLET OF BREWERTON**

Justin Nackley stated that the State has changed the rules regarding whether the town can be Lead Agency for the Main Street Funds. The town can no longer be that, so it is being handed over to a couple of individuals.

Mr. Dudzinski explained that the rules have changed and the Town of Cicero, can no longer be the Lead Agency. We needed to have someone from the Brewerton Chamber of Commerce to take charge of it and there were two volunteers. The Chamber of Commerce voted in favor of it and Helen Carrol, is here if there are any questions. I have absolutely no problem with it and feel that it is great that an organization within the town is willing to help us administer these funds.

Mr. Dudzinski read the following:

WHEREAS, the Town of Cicero adopted the Brewerton Strategic Revitalization Plan and Brewerton Hamlet Districts Form Based Code on November 24, 2008; and

WHEREAS, these documents outline strategies to revitalize the hamlet of Brewerton into an active, vibrant community center; and

WHEREAS, the Fort Brewerton greater Oneida Lake Chamber of Commerce seeks to partner with Onondaga County Community Development Division to apply for New York Main Street funds through the NYS Division of Housing and Community Renewal to undertake revitalization efforts within the downtown core of the hamlet of Brewerton; and

WHEREAS, the chamber will apply for these funds and subcontract with the County for administration, which will fund façade improvements, renovation of commercial space

And affordable housing rehabilitation; and

WHEREAS, the proposed NY Main Street program complements and enhances efforts already underway by the Town to revitalize this area; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town of Cicero fully supports the Chamber's application for NY Main Street funds for the hamlet of Brewerton.

DISCUSSION OF 1998 SALE OF PROPERTY TO BYRNES (PAPER ROAD) EXTENSION OF CHESTNUT STREET

Brad Brennan explained that Robert Byrnes contacted him about some concerns he had with a parcel of land that was purchased on December 31, 1998. It was a paper road at the end of Chestnut Street. Half of the road was split for the other contiguous neighbor and that deed was filed, but, the other deed was not filed. Because it was a paper road, the deed should have been from the Town of Cicero to Mr. Byrnes. Our Comptroller was able to find payment received at that time, so, I would request that we move forward with getting that deed done, so that he can have his proper proof of ownership.

Justin Nackley - If the board does move on that and allows the Supervisor to sign the deed packet, it will need to be subject to a permissive referendum.

Mr. Corl – This is cleaning up a deed that was unrecorded.

Justin Nackley – Yes, it is cleaning up something that has already been paid for. It is just a matter of going back and fixing the title, so that the owner can move on and should he wish to sell the house, it will clear up the title, which should have been done awhile ago.

Motion was made by Mr. Dudzinski, seconded by Mr. Corl, to authorize the Supervisor to sign a deed formally transferring ownership of the parcel of land known as “paper road” extension of Chestnut Street to Robert Byrnes and subject to permissive referendum.

Ms. Tarwacki asked when the permissive referendum would be posted and if that allowed people to come in and sign yes or no, or something like that.

Justin Nackley – Forgive me, but, I am not up to date on that as they have been dealing with Heather, but, there will be a time period that that will need to be done in.

Mr. Corl stated there may be 30 days to circulate a petition and there is a time period if they want to go to permissive referendum. It is not mandatory. The public would have to come forward and sign the necessary petitions and have them submitted and then the town would move forward on a referendum if the residents so chose.

Mr. Rybak – That’s what I don’t understand. Are they going to object to us giving something to this man that we should have given him 10 years ago?

Mr. Dudzinski – This is something that should have been done by a former attorney, back in 1998. Mr. Byrnes already purchased this parcel.

Mr. Byrnes – That’s correct and I paid the Town of Cicero on December 31, 1998. This all came about when I tried to refinance the house and they said I didn’t own the land. During research, we found that I had written a check, and the former attorney failed to file the deed. I paid for the land eleven years ago and don’t understand why there is a need for a referendum.

Justin Nackley – Unfortunately, it is just the way it was written in town law that we have to have it open for that. Yes, legally, it should have been taken care of at that point and time. It would be a headache if the permissive referendum came to be and the residents shot it down.

Ms. Tarwacki - So, you’re only looking at if someone comes in with signatures on a petition. Then we’d have to do something.

Justin Nackley - Yes

Ms. Tarwacki – I understand

Mr. Byrnes – If we have to wait 30 days, it’s no big deal as it’s been 11 years now.

Justin Nackley – It would only be, if residents were in opposition to doing this. Like everyone has said, it was passed before and it is only correcting an error.

**APPROVAL OF PROPOSED HYDRANT #12367 (PROJECT NO. 9003488)
IN THE EXISTING SNELLER ROAD WATER DISTRICT**

Wayne Dean explained that this hydrant is for a proposed subdivision where a gentleman is buying the corner of Sneller Road with Mud Mill Road to put a house on it. In order to do that, he’d like to extend the water main down Sneller Road to the corner and at the end of it, OCWA is proposing a hydrant to use for flushing purposes and for fire protection for the houses along that stretch on Sneller Road and they are asking us to take that over.

Mr. Dudzinski – It is going to cost \$30,000.00 and the individual is paying that himself.

Wayne Dean – That’s correct and is for the extension of the water main. They are just asking us for the maintenance fee on the hydrants.

Mr. Rybak – That is \$57.79 per annum.

**DISCUSSION OF PROPOSED HYDRANT (PROJECT NO. 4090023) IN
CONJUNCTION WITH THE OCDOT IMPROVEMENT, EAST TAFT ROAD
PROJECT OCWA (4090023)**

Wayne Dean – OCWA is putting in a new stretch of water main beneath Route 81 down on Taft Road and that project also involves the installation of a hydrant. They are asking us to take over the fees to maintain the hydrant. I can not recommend this one to the board. Chet and I have talked about this. It is located across from the Mobile Station and there is a vacant lot there. It isn't going to serve us any purpose. I believe the town has one property across the street from there, but, I doubt, that if there were a fire, they would pull hoses across Taft Road. I have also tried to contact OCWA and have not been able to get in touch with their Engineer that sent the letter to see why he requested the town to do this. At this time I can't recommend it.

Mr. Dudzinski – There is a hydrant down the street almost across from the one we're talking about. It makes no sense. This lot consists of nothing but a bunch of trees.

Ms. Tarwacki – They're always digging there.

Mr. Dudzinski – It makes no sense.

Ms. Tarwacki – I agree.

Wayne Dean – As I said, I haven't been able to get a hold of OCWA, so if you want to put this off until the next meeting, I may find out the reason.

Mr. Dudzinski – I would like to hear the reason.

**APPROVAL FOR JUSTICE DEPARTMENT TO HIRE LEE MAZZYE TEMPORARY
POSITION, NOT TO EXCEED 90 DAYS, \$14.00 PER/20 HOURS PER WEEK**

Judge Carl T. Putzer explained that a young lady in the Justice Department is about to have a baby any day and that they have been working with Jeanne Kulesa regarding this, as she is going to have to go out on maternity leave for 8 weeks. Laura is a full time employee working 40 hours per week and we need to get some help temporarily for that position while she is out. We were able to talk with somebody who has been a Chief Clerk for Town Justice Piraino, in the Town of Salina for 20 years, who is currently retired and who has been the President of the Local Town and Village Clerk's Association. She is willing to come in and help us on a temporary basis which would be good for two reasons. I don't believe you would have the money to hire somebody temporarily for 40 hours, but, Jeanne has told me there would be enough for 20 hours per week as it is budgeted, because Laura does not get paid for all of the time that she is out. If we could have her come in for 20 hours with her experience, she'd be able to do things quicker than somebody without any experience, thereby saving the town money and also continuing to keep up with the demands from our Police. Jeanne has worked with us on this and has checked with Civil Service and we can hire a temporary employee and it would not have to come off the list. Civil Service has no objection to this type of appointment. We also talked with the Union and there are no problems with their contract. It appears that the money would be there. I would ask the board to consider appointing Lee Mazzye, as a temporary employee to fill in as a part time clerk for a maximum of 20 hours per week and not to exceed 90 days while Laura Celluch is out on

maternity leave. Lee will be compensated at \$14.00 per hour and will commence when Laura begins her leave.

Mr. Rybak asked Jeanne if the funds will be available.

DISCUSSION OF MAINTENANCE OF RIVERSIDE CEMETERY

Jody Rogers explained that she copied the board with a letter that was received from Clarissa L. Stallknecht, Treasurer of the Riverside Cemetery of Brewerton, explaining the situation with the cemetery which she read as follows:

It is with great sorrow I write this letter requesting the Town of Cicero to take possession of the Riverside Cemetery of Brewerton. The cemetery association has not been active for a number of years and I am no longer able to continue to maintain the cemetery.

There are still graves for sale and the perpetual care fund has about \$6,000.00 in it depending on the daily stock market. However, I would be more than willing to continue to maintain the books and burials if that would help.

Jody explained that the cemetery association is no longer active and they are no longer able to take care of the cemetery, so she has had conversations with both Jeanne and Heather and they are in the process of working through this. However, she would like the board to accept the cemetery by State Law. The Cemetery has been abandoned, so by Town Law we are required to take it over. I have a Maintenance Contract in place as we thought this may be coming in, so we added it to our Mowing Contract. I would like to

get the mowing contractor out there to do the grass rather than come in late and have quite a bit of raking and what not. Heather is working on the deeds and the acceptance and the legal part of it. We're trying to get all of that paperwork together, but, I would like the board to accept the maintenance of this cemetery, per the Attorney's approval, saying this is the best way to go at this point.

PUBLIC INPUT 3 MINUTES PER SPEAKER

Roy Mallette, East Taft Road stated at the meeting of March 23, 2009 the Supervisor asked him to ask the board any questions he may have. I think at a previous meeting he said the same thing. I then sent an e-mail to the Town Clerk stating that he had a few questions he would like answered. How many trips were taken to Washington on behalf of Economic Development? How much money (side of tape ended). Did clerk give everyone a copy of my e-mail? Here are some new questions for the town board. Who applied for the town credit card? Was this done with board approval? Was this Brewerton Project authorized by the Town Board? Who authorized the attorney to redact their vouchers? I will take the Supervisor and town board at their word that they will answer questions to constituents. I got a letter from the Town Clerk, who said the questions were copied to the Town Board and per Charlottes request she was given all the records that I received pertaining to the questions. Has anyone looked into this since I sent this e-mail?

Mr. Dudzinski – We were going to be prepared to answer them tonight, but, Heather is sick and didn't have the opportunity to talk with her today.

Mr. Mallette – What?

Mr. Dudzinski – I was going to talk with Heather about it today, but, she went home sick.

Mr. Mallette said he had another question regarding the redacting of these vouchers from the attorney, who gave them the authority to redact their vouchers? He talked with Mr. Freeman and he said they aren't privileged. What are we trying to do? Are we trying to stop people from knowing what's going on in this town? I'd like to get a couple of answers. A couple of weeks have past since I sent you that e-mail. Is that right?

Mr. Dudzinski – I have no idea. What is your question?

Mr. Mallette – It was sent on March 24, 2009, to your Town Clerk. The Clerk is supposed to let the board know what's happening. I sent it to her and she replied that the questions were copied to the Town Board Members and per Charlottes request she was given all of the records that you received pertaining to the questions.

Ms. Tarwacki – I have here everything that she gave to you.

Mr. Mallette – Did you get all redacted stuff?

Ms. Tarwacki – Yes, there all redacted as well.

Mr. Mallette explained that he spent \$40.00 for Freedom of Information stuff that was scratched off by the attorney. The attorney is here now and I'm telling him right now, that it's illegal. Let them answer that one.

Mr. Rybak – Your questions are directed to us Roy, not him.

Mr. Mallette – I'm addressing it to you. Ask him to answer it.

Mr. Dudzinski – I was going to ask Heather this morning, but, I told you that she got sick.

Mr. Mallette - When are you going to give me an answer to this?

Ms. Tarwacki asked Justin if he knew if it was illegal to take information out of Freedom of Information requested documents?

Justin Nackley – There are always caveats to what you can or can not provide to individuals. Whether a certain document is permissible to be given out for Freedom of Information Law, Yes, but, information within that document can be redacted. For instance, say, you were a client, not related to the town, but, we had an instance where we

had to deal with you, your name could be redacted out of that information, because your name is not public information on what we were talking about you. There is certain information within FOIL documents that can be redacted. Do I know what was given in all of those documents? No. I don't do the town's day to day work. That's Heather. And again, there is information within FOIL documents that can be redacted.

Ms. Tarwacki – On some of these sheets, every other word is crossed out.

Justin Nackley – I haven't seen those, so I don't know. To me it is something that needs to be addressed with Heather when she gets back. There are things that can be redacted out and it is perfectly legal to do that.

Mr. Dudzinski – When Heather comes back I will talk with her.

Mr. Mallette – I'm telling this board that Mr. Freeman told me that they are not allowed to redact certain things. They are allowed to redact anything with litigation, but, when somebody says, they took a trip to Albany at \$450.00 I think the board should ask when.

Jody Sawyer lives on Jillian Lane in Brewerton and had spoken with Chet earlier about the easement concern that we have and the two or three feet of water that is in our easement, which is putting my children and everybody that lives in that area and their children at risk, because they could drown. If they got in there, they wouldn't get out. Pictures were given to the board.

Resident – I've lived there for six years and this has been a problem which has progressively gotten worse every single year. Every time that we call, someone comes out and looks at it and their answer is, we're working on it. That is exactly, what I'm being told. If you're working on it, where are they? I'm there 24/7 and so are the others, so where are these people who are working on it?

Resident told Wayne if he was waiting for it to get dry, it's not going to happen.

Wayne Dean – If we went in there now and did it, it would make a bigger mess that nobody wants to clean up.

Resident – We need to start someplace. Why if there's a problem would you wait until it's dry there rather than go in there now and look at it? We haven't had any significant rain this year, yet despite that, it's a mess back there. There are snakes, turtles and everything there. I want to know from a legal standpoint, when somebody gets hurt in that easement, who is liable?

Mr. Dudzinski – I think the question she's asking is that there is an existing problem and she want to know when are you going to come up and look at it?

Resident - They have all looked at it, but, do nothing.

Mr. Dudzinski asked Mr. Conway if he has looked at it.

Mr. Conway – Yes, we were there the other day.

Mr. Dudzinski – What do you think.

Mr. Conway – I know some of the problems. If you get down where the pipes go under the road into the big swale at the railroad tracks, it has been cleaned so many times, through there, that it is deep and the water, fills the hole in and doesn't get up to the pipe to run through. The biggest problem that I can see there is that the pipes are too high, that go under the railroad tracks and I don't know who they belong to. I don't know if they belong to the railroad or the county.

Mr. Dudzinski – The railroad has the right of way through there.

Mr. Conway – We looked at it the other day, and the water is deep under those pipes.

Mr. Dudzinski - Do you have any suggestions?

Mr. Conway explained that it is something they haven't done.

A resident stated that she was disappointed as this problem has existed for six years and the CEO knows how to fix it as it was fixed on LeBeau, Jacob Lane and Jillian. The problem is causing mosquitoes and the kids are safer playing in the road rather than playing in the swamp. It is not an easement, it is a swamp that smells, and the problem should be fixed tomorrow.

Another resident stated that in one of the pictures there is a large swing set which is in his back yard and his child and friends aren't able to use it because the water is up to their knees, while their sitting on a swing set in the summer. That is up into my yard going away from the easement, toward my house. It is a major problem.

Resident – I know, you want it to be dry but, I've been there 6 years and it isn't going to be dry. There has got to be an answer.

Mr. Dudzinski asked if Gary Cannerelli has been up there.

Resident – Yes, and we've spoken with him.

Mr. Dudzinski – Let's get Gary up there to address the problem because it has been going on too long.

A resident stated that she offered to fix it but was told she couldn't because it was town property and also wanted to know who is responsible should a child drown in there. Would she be responsible?

Mr. Dudzinski – I hope that situation never occurs.

Resident – So, do I, but, I don't want to be unrealistic either. That's how bad it is back there.

Mr. Dudzinski requested that Wayne and Gary Cannerelli go out there, along with Vern, and myself if I am around, as I want to go with you. These people have been suffering for too long.

Resident asked if she could be given an answer as to whether it would fall on the homeowner.

Justin Nackley stated that they are probably right, but it would depend on the situation. It's your land and an easement over the land that is granted to the town. It is not the town's land. From what everyone is saying, I doubt it. Usually easements are just provided to the town for use and maintenance for the water to go through. It is probably not the town's liability for that situation and would be the homeowners in that situation.

Resident – It's our property, but, we're not allowed to fix the problem. We have to rely on the town and the town isn't doing anything.

Wayne Dean – How would you fix that?

Resident – I'm not an engineer, so it isn't my problem. I pay my taxes like everyone else sitting in this room. I'm not an engineer and I'm not going to ask you how you're going to save my life. That's for an engineer to do and they fixed it across the street and it's beautiful.

Mr. Dudzinski – We will get Gary Cannerelli up there with Wayne, Vern and myself and find out what's going on. If you don't hear from me within a week call me.

Mr. Conway – Gary Repko and I were there two weeks ago and where it goes under the road, there was no water going into the pipe. We didn't go all the way up to LeBeau and look at that.

Resident stated that it's dry in the corners, but water doesn't run up hill.

Mr. Conway stated that we will need to get the Highway Department over there to get some elevations for us, to see where the high and low spots are, to see what we can do. We've spent a lot of money up on LeBeau and I know there were fences in the easements.

Resident – I know I'm not in the easement.

Mr. Conway stated that about 6 years ago a lot of work was done in LeBeau.

Jessica Zambrano asked Mr. Conway how much money is allocated for drainage this year. How much is in these funds to fix these problems.

Mr. Conway - \$280,000.00 for off road.

Jeanne Kulesa stated that off the top of her head it is in that area and is what was budgeted for this year to be spent for all drainage.

Jessica Zambrano - How many projects do you have on the list this year?

Mr. Conway – I believe 8 or 9. Last year we didn't have a lot of money in the drainage budget and we had allotted a lot, to do Rosewood Circle. The DEC jerked us around for 2 or 3 months and then came back and said, no. That was in December and it was too late to do any of the other stuff.

Jessica Zambrano asked if the list is a carry over from last year.

Mr. Conway – That was the only big one we had from last year left and then we couldn't do it.

Jessica Zambrano – Is your drainage list projects, public?

Mr. Conway explained that he didn't believe we've ever put them out to the public, that that he knew of. We just sat down and went over them. There is a big one off Lakeshore Road and after they get the hole done, O'Brien & Gere will take some readings to see how deep we had to go through the swamp over through Belnor. That is probably the biggest one that we have this year.
