The Cicero Town Board held their regular meeting on **Wednesday, February 10, 2016** at **6:30 p.m.** at the Cicero Town Hall, 8236 Brewerton Road, Cicero, NY 13039.

Supervisor Venesky opened the 3rd regular meeting of the Town Board at 6:30 p.m. by noting the locations of the three emergency exits, asked that all electronic devices be silenced and noted if anyone had difficulty hearing to bring it to the Board's attention.

Councilor Conway led the Pledge of Allegiance, and then requested a moment of silence for our troops in harm's way.

**Approval of Town Board Meeting Minutes**

Councilor Conway made a motion to approve the Town Board minutes [from the Regular Town Board Meeting] held on January 27, 2016. Motion was seconded by Councilor Cushman.

Supervisor Venesky solicited any Board discussion. There was none.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

**Approval of Abstract Numbers 5&6**

Councilor Cushman made a motion to accept Abstract #5 (dated February 3, 2016), and Abstract #6 (dated February 10, 2016) as they were presented. Motion was seconded by Councilor Becallo.

Supervisor Venesky solicited any Board discussion. There was none.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

**Budget Modifications/Amendments**

Councilor Cushman stated there were no budget modifications/amendments.

**Onondaga County Legislator, Tim Burtis**

Supervisor Venesky introduced special guest Onondaga County Legislator, Tim Burtis representing Onondaga County District 3.

Legislator Burtis began by congratulating all the board members that were newly elected/newly appointed and thanked them for their service.

Legislator Burtis was there to talk about the Brewerton Wastewater Treatment Plant, what the County has done, and what they have done downtown to help the Town of Cicero. He said this really is the Suburban Green Improvement Program. It was brought through the Environmental Protection Committee that he was on last year on November 10<sup>th</sup>, and then it was brought to the legislature December 1<sup>st</sup>. He said was proud to co-sponsor the resolution, which had passed unanimously. As legislator, he currently serves on two standing committees: Environmental Protection (vice chair) and Health (vice chair). Legislator Burtis commented that it is quite something to go from the Cicero Town Board to the Onondaga County Legislature.

Legislator Burtis explained that what this is really about is I&I (infiltration and inflow). Cicero has a grant for \$225,000 dollars coming from the County in order to reduce infiltration and inflow from the Town's sanitary sewer system using *innovative* or *green construction* methods. What they are looking to do is basically reduce what he would call 'clean water' into a pipe that is really designed for really dirty water or sewer. They are looking at pipes and manhole repairs trying to see what we can do to reduce that water that is getting in there.

Legislator Burtis expressed his happiness to be able to co-sponsor this in December, to be at this meeting, and to bring money back from the County to his town (Cicero). He said he hopes to do this many more times and looks forward to working with this board.

Supervisor Venesky said last year we knew only a little bit about the infiltration and inflow issue in Brewerton. We were told that we have had a problem for over twenty years. We have had fresh water getting into the sanitary system at certain times of the year; spring run-off, heavy rain periods, and it overwhelms the capacity of the Brewerton Sewer Plant. We have opened up our Comprehensive Plan, and are in the beginning stages of rewriting that. He thinks business development is going to be crucial to the future of Cicero; having sewer pipes that work in Brewerton, and taking fresh water out, allows us to go after some of the hotels, restaurants, and businesses that we need.

Supervisor Venesky thanked Legislator Burtis for all the time and effort he put into this to help Cicero.

Legislator Burtis said as we look towards the future we really need to know what the capacity of Brewerton is. He has already spoken to the WWTP (Wastewater Treatment Plant) already regarding this and it is his belief that many sump pumps are pushing into the sewer and that's where the water is coming from. It's a problem when you get heavy rain, and it's also why it goes up significantly. It is also why we are searching for the true capacity in Brewerton, and what some of the issues are. He is hopeful that this is a first step to reduce the infiltration and inflow so that we can check the capacity and be able to try to do some more good things, as far as adding onto the pipe.

### Public Hearings

- **Public Hearing to consider proposed amendments and additional language to Chapter 105 (Firearms and Other Weapons) of the Cicero Town Code by Local Law adoption procedure.**

Supervisor Venesky had proof of publication and posting.

**PLEASE TAKE NOTICE** that the Town of Cicero Town Board will hold a Public Hearing on February 10, 2016 commencing at 6:30 pm local time at Cicero Town Hall, 8236 Brewerton Road, Cicero, NY, to consider proposed amendments and additional language to Chapter 105 (Firearms and Other Weapons) of the Cicero Town Code by Local Law adoption procedure. The purpose of the proposed amendments and additions is to more clearly define terms, rules and exceptions regarding the possession of weapons within public buildings and spaces within the Town of Cicero. A draft of the proposed changes will be posted on the Town website. By the order of the Cicero Town Board

Supervisor Venesky opened the public hearing at 6:40 p.m.

Gary Rizzo asked for an explanation on the proposed changes.

Supervisor Venesky explained that he was approached by the judges in the court system. We have the 2<sup>nd</sup> busiest court system now in Onondaga County, and there are a lot of people that come in here. The judges felt that we had an unsecure courtroom because of all of the people that are coming in; the majority of them not being residents of the Town of Cicero. He said that the judges are concerned about the safety of the court employees and their own personal safety, so they had a meeting with Chief Snell and they talked about what would be the best thing in the Town of Cicero to address having our bailiffs to be able to carry firearms. He said they would be licensed, trained, ex-police officers to do that.

Supervisor Venesky said, ‘Unfortunately, in this day and age with so many people who have trouble controlling themselves, or their behavior, so we decided it was probably a good idea to entertain this.’

Councilor Karp said once he opened up the law and took a look at it he saw that there were strange definitions. A very kind-of tortured definition of ‘Person’ and ‘Carry’, and as an attorney he looks at any law that creates a criminal offense and he thinks it needs to be made as clear as possible because people have potential consequences associated with that, so what he did was:

- Strike ‘Carry’ and replaced it with ‘Possess’.
- Strike ‘Person’ because there is no need to define ‘Person’ in a criminal statute unless you are intending to include or exclude corporations, trusts, or other legal entities.
- They had a very strange definition of ‘Weapon’, which he discussed with Chief Snell and they replaced that with definitions from the Penal Law.
- We had ‘Public Building’, which included the land that the building was on, which is strange. If someone just sees that weapons possession is prohibited in a public building they may assume that that is the building only and does not include town property even though the definition did. So we changed the definition of ‘Building’ to include ‘any structure located on public grounds’.
- We instituted a new definition for ‘Public Grounds’ which is the actual land that any town property is or the buildings may be located on.
- We simplified the Weapons Possession statute. He removed a double negative from the statute about refusing to turn over weapons that someone is caught with and then,
- He added an ‘Exemptions’ section exempting police officers, peace officers, military personnel who are carrying a weapon in the course of their official duties, as well as federal law enforcement officers. And then, he created an additional carve-out in the event that certain members of town government needed to be able to appoint or designate other individuals to be able to carry weapons on town property.

Gary Rizzo told the Board that there had been a misunderstanding out on the street about what was going on about this. He asked if there were going to be signs put up for a ‘gun free zone’ for Cicero Little League.

Councilor Karp replied that the purpose of this was not to ‘change’ or ‘add’ anything, it was to clarify the existing rules. A portion was also added so that if someone comes onto Town property to conduct business (and maybe they are on their way to or from hunting or some other lawful activity, and they have got a weapon in the trunk of their vehicle), that the interior of the vehicle is *not* a prohibited place as long as it is *temporarily* and *lawfully* located in the driveway or parking area of Town property.

Councilor Karp told Mr. Rizzo that quite to the contrary of what some of those rumors may be, the exact opposite was the intent.

Jody Rogers referred to what Mr. Rizzo had mentioned about Cicero Little League and the parks and commented that we do have the statute in our local law about weapons, but the only individuals she believes are allowed to carry in the park are police officers.

Chief Snell added that with the way it was written one of the sections would conflict with the other.

Councilor Karp said that is why there is no need to have two separate statutes governing town property; the parks are town property. He will be drafting a resolution to have another public hearing to strike that portion of the Town Parks law so that this will be covered by one comprehensive statute.

Gary Rizzo asked if a full carry for the State of New York supersedes the Town ordinance.

Councilor Karp replied that under NY Penal Law § 400.00(6) License: validity, it says that a license issued to Penal Law of § 400.00(2)(f), which would include a full carry permit, is valid notwithstanding any local law or ordinance. That is called 'statewide preemption' and that means that you cannot be prosecuted for violating a town ordinance if you are lawfully carrying pursuant to a lawfully issued permit. Councilor Karp explained that it is a state law and it is nothing that the town has any choice over.

Don Bloss said he had read the Chapter 105, and all of the subchapters. He asked what the procedure was if an individual has conceal carry and he is out all day and wants to make the town board meeting, drives over here, gets out of his car, and has his carry-on, is it exactly as it states in Chapter 105?

Don Bloss said it says 'if you knowingly carry they are going to ask you to leave'.

Councilor Karp explained because of Penal Law § 400.06 (which makes the permit valid notwithstanding any local law or ordinance), a person could not only *not* be prosecuted; they couldn't have their weapon confiscated. They could be asked to leave town property, or to place it in their vehicle.

Don Bloss said he could see somebody with a conceal carry on and off town property, in and out of a town meeting. He asked how they would know if he had a concealed carry.

Councilor Karp replied that he wouldn't.

Don Bloss said his biggest concern was that they set up a 'gun-free' zone.

Councilor Karp said he understood Don's concern. He explained that with the way that the law already was firearms were already prohibited on town property before this. This is not creating any new 'gun-free' zone. In fact, because of the carve out for vehicle possession it actually loosens restrictions. But, as far as carrying concealed - State law says that towns *cannot* prohibit concealed carry pursuant to a permit on their property (this cannot change that because that's a State law, and State law supersedes Local law), so there is no change to that. If someone is discovered to be carrying they can be asked to leave town property or be asked to place their gun in their vehicle, but this doesn't create any new 'gun-free zone'.

Councilor Karp said he understood from what Mr. Rizzo stated that there may be a misconception out there, but this doesn't make anything stricter at all. It does not add any restrictions that did not exist. In fact, it mildly loosens a couple that did already exist.

Speaking against – None

Supervisor Venesky closed the public hearing at 6:50 p.m.

Supervisor Venesky solicited any Board discussion.

**Resolution:**

Councilor Karp moved the adoption of a resolution to approve the following proposed amendments and additional language to Chapter 105 (Firearms and Other Weapons) of the Cicero Town Code by Local Law adoption procedure. (The purpose of the proposed amendments and additions is to more clearly define terms, rules and exceptions regarding the possession of weapons within public buildings and spaces within the Town of Cicero. To be known as Local Law 1 of 2016):

Chapter 105 of the Town Code is hereby amended:

By striking "Carry" and its definition in §105-4.

By striking "Person" and its definition in §105-4.

By striking the definition of "Weapon" in §105-4 and replacing it with the following text:

A deadly weapon or dangerous instrument, as such terms are defined in subdivisions twelve and thirteen, respectively, of section 10.00 of the New York Penal Law.

By striking the definition of the term "Public Building" in §105-4 and replacing it with the following text:

Any structure located on public grounds.

By adding a definition for a new term, "Public Grounds," to §105-4 with the following text:

Any real property owned, occupied, or operated by the Town of Cicero, but not including the interior of a privately owned vehicle temporarily and lawfully located in a roadway or parking area of such real property owned, occupied, or operated by the Town of Cicero.

By striking the text of §105-5 and replacing it with the following:

It shall be unlawful to possess a weapon in a public building or upon public grounds.

By striking the text of §105-6 and replacing it with the following:

A person who possesses a weapon in a public building or upon public grounds shall surrender the same upon the request of any police officer or peace officer, as such terms are defined in the New York Criminal Procedure Law, or any other individual authorized by the Town of Cicero to make such request. Surrendered weapons shall be returned to the individual who surrendered them upon their departure from the public building or public grounds provided that they may be lawfully possessed by such individual.

By adding a new section, §105-20, entitled "Exemptions" with the following text:

The provisions of this Chapter shall not apply to:

1. Persons in the military service of the State of New York when duly authorized by regulations issued by the adjutant general;
2. Police officers as defined in subdivision thirty-four of section 1.20 of the New York Criminal Procedure Law;
3. Peace officers as defined by section 2.10 of the New York Criminal Procedure Law;
4. Persons in the military or other service of the United States, in pursuit of official duty or when duly authorized by federal law, regulation, or order;
5. Individuals authorized by the Chief of Police, Supervisor, or a Justice of the Town of Cicero.

Motion was seconded by Councilor Cushman.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

- **Public Hearing to consider the acceptance of the Petition Plan and Contract Drawings for the Oneida River, Oneida Lake, and Chittenango Creek Drainage Improvement associated with the Longergan Commercial Subdivision. The Town Planning Board approved the Preliminary Plan in March of 2014.**

Supervisor Venesky had proof of publication and posting:

By the order of the Cicero Town Board</p>
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Supervisor Venesky opened the public hearing at 6:51 p.m.

Elise Taetsch, EIT from L.J.R. Engineering, P.C. was present to speak on behalf of the developer of the Longergan Commercial Subdivision, L&P Operations, LLC, to obtain Town Board approval for the Petition Plan and Contract Drawings. She began by explaining that the 49 acre site is on the north side of Sneller Road, to the east of Route 81. The site currently consists of crop fields, brush, some woods, and she believes that there are some vehicles stored on site. The zoning is General Commercial Plus. The Preliminary Plan was previously approved on March 24, 2014 and is effective through March of 2016. The Developer is proposing to construct approximately 2500 linear feet of 6 to 36-inch diameter storm sewers and appurtenances along with a stormwater management facility, and an associated outlet structure with a 24-inch outlet pipe. The facilities will service the commercial lots within the development and will be constructed by the Developer; they will be dedicated to the Town of Cicero at no cost. Storm water from this site will be conveyed via swales and storm sewers to the proposed storm water management facility, ultimately draining to Oneida Lake. The estimated construction cost is \$125,000 dollars. There will be an annual charge by the Oneida River, Oneida Lake, and Chittenango Creek Drainage district for operation and maintenance of the system, and the charge in 2016 is .14 cents per one-thousand of assessed value.

Elise Taetsch solicited any questions. There were none.

Supervisor Venesky asked Steve Snell if he wanted to add anything.

Steve Snell said he had nothing further, other than the letter that they had already provided to the Board.

Speaking against – None.

A resident asked where Sneller Road was.

Elise Taetsch said Sneller Road was an extension of Pardee Road.

Jon Barrett asked if they were going to put the water hydrants down the road.

Elise Taetsch said that there is water proposed because there is an existing water main, OCWA (Onondaga County Water Authority).

Jon Barrett said he knows that area and that's one of the areas without hydrants; the nearest one is down on the corner.

Supervisor Venesky thanked Jon Barrett for bringing that up.

Supervisor Venesky said that we have had discussions for everyone else with planning board to make sure that our fire departments are brought in for these decisions so that they get the maps that they need and can add any input.

Jon Barrett said that was one of the comments they did have at the planning board -to make sure that we had water as it develops.

Supervisor Venesky solicited any further comments. There were none.

Supervisor Venesky closed the public hearing at 6:54 p.m.

Supervisor Venesky solicited any Board discussion. There was none.

**SEQRA:** Councilor Becallo moved the adoption of a resolution that the request of L&P Operations, LLC for the construction of drainage improvement and roadway surfaces within the Lonergan Commercial Subdivision pursuant to the Petition Plan and Contract Drawings for work within the Oneida River, Oneida Lake and Chittenango Creek Drainage Improvement districts for the Lonergan Commercial Subdivision is an Unlisted Action involving no other permit granting agencies outside the Town. The proposed action will not have a significant adverse effect upon the environment and therefore does not require the preparation of an Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS). Motion was seconded by Councilor Cushman.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

**DECISION:** Councilor Becallo moved the adoption of a resolution accepting the Petition Plan and Contract Drawings for alterations and modifications to the Oneida River, Oneida Lake, and Chittenango Creek Drainage Improvement areas for the Lonergan Commercial Subdivision project subject to review and approval by the Town Engineer. Motion was seconded by Councilor Cushman.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

### **Brewerton Wastewater Treatment Plant**

Supervisor Venesky moved the adoption of a resolution to approve and authorize the Supervisor to execute the proposal from O'Brien & Gere to provide Engineering Services related to the Brewerton WWTP (Wastewater Treatment Plant) Service Area (Oneida Park) Sanitary Sewer Improvement Project. The work is being completed based on a \$225,000.00 grant the Town received from Onondaga County to reduce infiltration and inflow into the Town's sanitary sewer system using innovative construction methods. The estimated fee is \$35,000.00 and would be billed against on an hourly basis in accordance with our Master Professional Services Agreement. Motion was seconded by Councilor Conway.

Supervisor Venesky solicited any Board discussion. There was none.

Steve Snell stated that these improvements were the same that were identified in the grant application. It's estimated that over 11 million gallons would be removed annually from the sewer system because of this project, so it's definitely worth pursuing.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

### **North Syracuse Fire Contract**

Councilor Conway moved for the adoption of a resolution authorizing the Supervisor and Councilors to execute the Amended 2016 Fire Protection Agreement with the North Syracuse Fire Department (Village of North Syracuse).

Supervisor Venesky solicited any Board discussion. There was none.

Motion was seconded by Councilor Cushman.

Ayes – 4, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 1. *Motion carried.* Councilor Becallo abstaining.

### **Town Clerk**

Councilor Becallo moved for the adoption of a resolution to approve the Annual Software Support/Maintenance Agreement with Business Automation Services, Inc. for the Town Clerk's Office for an annual amount of \$1,355.00.

Motion was seconded by Councilor Karp.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

### **Highway Department**

#### **A. Purchase Approvals**

Councilor Conway moved for the adoption of a resolution to approve the following purchases:

- \$6,000.00 to URW America for traffic sign system upgrades (budgeted item)
- \$5,000.00 to 3M for traffic sign material
- \$1,183.96 to Allied Spring for springs for Truck #12
- \$5,007.47 to United Auto Supply for bulk oil
- \$3,987.72 to HI-Line Inc. for supplies for hose fittings, shrink tubing, and grease fittings
- \$1,725.00 to Beam Mack for 3 pumps for injectors for Truck #12

Motion was seconded by Councilor Karp.

**B. Declare HP Officejet surplus**

Councilor Conway moved for the adoption of a resolution to declare the HP Officejet 4610 printer from the Highway Department as surplus, to be disposed, and of no use to the Town. Motion was seconded by Councilor Becallo.

Supervisor Venesky solicited any Board discussion. There was none.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

**Parks and Recreation Department**

Councilor Karp moved the adoption of a resolution to approve the following purchases for the Garage Renovation Project (Budgeted project to insulate and heat two bays in the pole barn work area for Park's staff.):

- \$6,560.00 to Davis Mechanical for Heating – natural gas fired infrared tube heating
- \$5,588.40 to Mac Electric for Electrical – miscellaneous wiring, lighting, and removal of all existing wiring to allow for the installation of insulation and framing for metal siding.
- \$11,500.00 to RLS Structures, Inc. for Insulation – closed cell foam on walls and batt where applicable on the ceiling
- \$6,700.00 to RLS Structures, Inc. for Framing/Carpentry – purlins walls and ceiling to accept metal siding, doors and wall to close in above storage
- \$13,325.00 to RLS Structures, Inc. for Metal – walls and ceiling

Motion was seconded by Councilor Cushman.

Supervisor Venesky solicited any Board discussion. There was none.

**Police Department**

Councilor Becallo moved for the adoption of a resolution to approve the annual fee of \$1,758.00 to access the LEADS Online Program (Online Investigation System) to help solve crimes. Motion was seconded by Councilor Karp.

Supervisor Venesky solicited any Board discussion. There was none.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

**Set Public Hearing Date – New Class of Licensing**

Removed from the agenda. The topic will be revisited at the next scheduled meeting.

**Discussion Items**

- **Sign Code**

Supervisor Venesky said Councilor Becallo had made some recommendations last year regarding signs.

Councilor Becallo said he had given a copy of the recommendations to the Board, and they would be posted online. He then told the new town board members whether they wanted to make any changes to the current code was up to them. They were not to be forced by any citizens, or anyone, because it was their choice.

Councilor Becallo explained that the reason he got involved with *Signs* is because he wanted the fees to go away. He commented that the Sign Committee had made some really good suggestions and recommended that the board members look them over, and then they could set a public hearing and hear everyone's thoughts and suggestions regarding the matter.

Councilor Becallo emphasized that the suggestions were recommendations at this time from the Sign Committee; they were not final. Councilor Becallo stated again that he wants to see the fees go away.

Councilor Becallo solicited any discussion.

Supervisor Venesky stated that some of the new board members wanted time to read the suggestions so there would be no action taken on Signs that evening.

- **CanTeen**

Supervisor Venesky said Toni' Lyn Brauchle came to the last board meeting and spoke about some of the great stuff that they do at the CanTeen. After that presentation an article came across his desk that said our CanTeen is noticed statewide. They have achieved a state notoriety as a well-run good program. This week we had our first monthly staff meeting, and Chief Snell threw out some really good numbers. Chief Snell said with the CanTeen and the success of the CanTeen, and all of the young people that have been attending there, the juvenile arrest numbers have been going down. Supervisor Venesky said it speaks to the program that Jody Rogers manages for this town. He has had the privilege working with her and she does a very good job. She also has an eye for talent and has loaded the department at various functions with very talented people who do a good job.

- **Community Development Grant (Jody Rogers):**

Jody Rogers said we were just notified that we received a \$50,000 dollar Community Development Grant which is part of the Skyway Park Neighborhood Community Playground Project, which she submitted in 2015. It's a 25 percent match, so it's \$12,500.00 dollars that comes from the town. She has a little bit that we budgeted in our town budget; \$4,000.00 dollars of that and the balance is going to be in-kind money. We are expecting to put in an inclusive playground unit that is similar to what we put in at Central Park at Skyway Park that would include all of the community that is across the street at Taft Road. In that area, and with the number of homes there, it should be a great addition to that park. Also, with the North Syracuse Little League that uses that park there are a lot of children that come to the park and are not playing in the ball games and they are running around where they shouldn't be in that park and with the way the traffic is we are trying to correct that and provide a safe area for them to play in. We are very excited, and we are also very pleased that the County felt that this was a worthwhile project.

### **Public Input**

Mr. Rizzo asked if there is a \$75.00 fee that was imposed on fire inspections. He also asked how long someone has to pay it.

Supervisor Venesky replied yes. He said those buildings have to be inspected on annual basis and there is a cost associated with doing the inspections. He wasn't sure how long someone had to pay the fee but said he could check with the Codes department and find out.

Terry Manning was visiting from the Town of Sullivan. He said about a year and a half to about two years ago under Jim Corl's direction there was talk of a development in the Lyon's farm area, right off Route 31 in the hamlet of Bridgeport. He said there was a lot of noise about it initially, but they haven't heard anything more since then. When they saw Chittenango Creek on the agenda it caught their attention; they are curious as to what's going on with that.

Supervisor Venesky said nothing, as far as he knew. There was no application to our Planning Board that he was aware of.

### **Adjournment**

Supervisor Venesky made a motion to adjourn.

Councilor Cushman seconded the motion.

Ayes – 5, Noes – 0, and Abstentions- 0. *Motion carried unanimously.*

There being no further business before the Board the meeting was adjourned at 7:16 p.m.
